<u>Reply</u>: The effect of the sewage charge and trade effluent surcharge concessions in

the 2002-03 Budget is the reduction in government's general revenue. It does not directly affect the recurrent expenditure estimates of the sewage services programme. As compared to the revised estimate 2001-02, the draft Revenue Estimate for 2002-03 will decrease by approximately 50%

and 25% for sewage charge and trade effluent surcharge respectively.

We will continue to closely monitor and control our recurrent expenditure so as to deliver cost effective services to the public. To achieve this, various cost saving measures have been adopted such as:

- (a) optimising the utilisation of existing in-house staff to conduct regular preventive maintenance of plants and equipment so as to reduce the expenditure on hiring of maintenance services;
- (b) reducing the operating expenditure of sewage treatment plants through optimisation of treatment process; and
- (c) enhancing the efficiency of the maintenance through better planning and scheduling of works with the aid of computerised system.

According to my understanding, as there are lesser number of reclamation projects nowadays, it is difficult to find outlets for accommodating inert construction and demolition (C&D) materials. Under the circumstances, it may have to make use of municipal landfills for the purpose; the handling cost would increase substantially. Accordingly, would the Government please advise this Committee on the following:

- (a) What is the cost of handling inert C&D materials in reclamation areas and landfills respectively? When are the existing reclamation areas expected to be filled up so it becomes necessary to make use of municipal landfills for the purpose?
- (b) To avoid the wastage of resources, has the Environment and Food Bureau discussed with the Planning and Lands Bureau and the Territory Development Department to advance some reclamation projects to satisfy the need for accommodating inert C&D materials?

Reply:

- (a) The costs (including capital and operation costs) of handling inert C&D materials in reclamation areas and landfills are about \$50 per tonne and \$125 per tonne respectively. The existing reclamation areas are expected to be filled up by late 2002. To avoid C&D materials going to landfills, we will set up fill banks to stockpile inert C&D materials until new reclamation projects are available.
- (b) The Environment and Food Bureau has been discussing with other bureaux/departments the feasibility of advancing reclamation projects, such as Penny's Bay Reclamation Stage 2 and South East Kowloon Development reclamation projects.

- (a) The Department has been actively promoting waste reduction initiatives in recent years. However, why does the tonnage of waste to be received in the strategic landfills in 2002 (6 100 000 tonnes) only decrease by less than one percentage point (0.6%) as compared to 2001 (6 138 340 tonnes)?
- (b) The mass relocation of Hong Kong factories to the Mainland in recent years has resulted in a significant reduction in the amount of industrial discharge. As such, why does the tonnage of special wastes to be treated at the Chemical Waste Treatment Centre in 2002 (62 000 tonnes) only decrease by 1.5 percentage points (%) as compared to 2001 (63 000 tonnes)?

Reply:

(a) The amount of waste disposed of at landfills is governed by factors such as population growth, economic development, waste generation patterns as well as the effect of waste reduction measures. We have taken into account the trend in the past years and the likely scenarios of the governing factors in estimating the amount for 2002.

The waste disposed of at landfills is mainly municipal solid waste and construction and demolition waste. The total amount of municipal solid waste disposed of at landfills was 3.383, 3.407 and 3.395 million tonnes in 1999, 2000 and 2001 respectively. This indicated an increase of 0.7% from 1999 to 2000 and a decrease of 0.3% from 2000 to 2001. Based on this trend and taking into account enhanced waste reduction efforts since 2001 against population increase and waste growth, it is anticipated that there will be a net decrease of municipal solid waste in the order of about 1% from 2001 to 2002.

On the other hand, the amount of construction and demolition waste requiring disposal at landfills depends on construction activities as well as the availability of public filling areas for inert construction and demolition materials. In general, the level of construction activities in 2002 is likely to be similar to 2001 but we would see an increase of construction and demolition waste disposed of at landfills in 2002 as a result of closure of some public filling areas. However it is not possible to estimate this amount at this stage.

Hence in overall terms, we have only projected a waste intake of 6.1 million tonnes at landfills in 2002 which is about 0.6% decrease from that in 2001.

(b) There has been a general decrease in the amount of waste going to the Chemical Waste Treatment Centre in recent years as chemical waste producers adopted waste minimisation practices and in-house treatment, and many industries moved out of Hong Kong. The waste intake at the Chemical Waste Treatment Centre in 2001 was about the same as that in 2000 because the decrease from land-based waste producers was largely offset by an increase of oily waste from ocean-going vessels visiting Hong Kong. In the current economic situation, we expect the 2002 total to be slightly less than 2001.

The percentage for the latter indicator to be achieved in 2002 will remain at the same level as last year (i.e. 64%). Do these indicate that there will be no improvement in the air quality of Hong Kong in future?

Reply:

The short-term (hourly or daily averages) Air Quality Objectives would be exceeded occasionally when the weather is very calm resulting in building up of pollutants. These exceedances correspond to the peak concentrations of air pollution. Because of the implementation of the air pollution control programmes, we expect these peak values will decrease over the coming years, and result in higher compliance rate.

The long-term (annual average) Air Quality Objectives refer to the average concentrations over a full year. These objectives are not met mainly at urban areas. The air pollution control programmes will reduce also the annual average readings. However, when compared to the reduction in peak values the magnitude of reduction averaged over a year would be smaller. We expect the compliance rate to improve in a more gradual manner and hence have adopted the compliance rate of 64% in 2001 as the best estimate for 2002.

- (2) The new posts to be created include 1 Senior Engineer, 2 Engineers and 1 Inspector of Works. They are responsible for management of construction and demolition materials in the following specific areas:
 - (i) To formulate strategy and plan for construction and demolition materials sorting facilities;
 - (ii) To formulate strategy and plan for construction and demolition materials recycling facilities; and
 - (iii) To plan and manage the operation of temporary fill banks.

The above duties are independent of that mentioned in Question (1). Nevertheless, both are crucial components of the work in construction and demolition materials management.

billion dollars. It involves public expenditure and a huge sum of sewage charges to be born by the industrial and commercial sectors. Regarding this,

can the Government inform this Council:

(a) the progress of the Strategic Sewage Disposal Scheme so far and the works scheduled to be carried out and completed in the coming financial year? Can the details be provided?

(b) Innovative sewage treatment methods, which are both environmental friendly and cost-effective, have been adopted by many places in the world including the Mainland. Has the Department sought after new technologies from experts concerned all over the world and on the Mainland so that, together with our existing sewerage facilities, the amount of investment and recurrent expenditure of the Strategic Sewage Disposal Scheme can be reduced? If not, what are the reasons?

Reply:

- (a) Stage I of the Harbour Area Treatment Scheme (HATS), formerly known as the Strategic Sewage Disposal Scheme (SSDS), has been fully completed and successfully commissioned in December 2001. It is now treating about 70% of the sewage flows from the metropolitan area around the Victoria Harbour and removing about 600 tonnes of highly polluted sludge that used to go into the harbour everyday. Since its commissioning, it has already brought about a very substantial improvement to water quality in the eastern harbour. In the coming year, the Government will proceed with a series of studies and trials in relation to the way forward of the subsequent stages of the scheme as detailed in part (b) of this reply.
- (b) In 2000, we commissioned an International Review Panel (IRP) comprising local, Mainland and overseas experts to review the way forward of the HATS. In May 2001, the Government obtained funding approval from the Finance Committee to pursue studies and trials, including trials of compact sewage treatment technologies with well proven track record of large-scale application, to assess the environmental, financial and engineering viability of the options recommended by the IRP in end 2000. The technologies on trial were selected by means of an open process during which prospective local and non-local vendors and contractors were invited to express interest. We commenced the major studies and trials in November 2001 and January 2002 respectively. They are expected to be complete by end 2003.

- (b) Regarding the indicators under Programme (2), there is a decrease of 1 083 and 2 093 in the number of prosecutions against licensed food premises and unlicensed food premises respectively in 2001-02 compared with that in 2000-01, i.e. a decrease of 19.7% and 42.6%. Is there any relation between the decrease in the number of prosecutions and the number of inspections to food premises? If not, what are the reasons?
- (c) Please provide the number of prosecutions successfully instituted against food premises in 2000/01 and 2001/02 and the general reasons for unsuccessful prosecutions.

Reply:

The information sought is provided as follows -

- (a) The reduction in the number of inspections to food premise by 81 699 is based on the comparison of inspection figures for calendar year 2000 and 2001. The reasons for the drop are
 - (i) The alignment of the 3-category inspection frequency for licensed food premises based on their compliance record to "8, 4, 2" weeks for all districts from "8, 4, 2" weeks for urban districts and "8, 3, 1" week(s) for New Territories districts; and
- (ii) The redeployment of Health Inspectors from general inspection work to handle urgent food safety incidents such as the outbreak of Cholera cases and avain flu.

We would wish to emphasize that food safety for the public was in no way compromised by the reduction in the number of inspections carried out.

(b) The decrease in prosecutions against licensed food premises was mainly due to the trade displaying overall a higher level of compliance with the food regulations in force.

The decrease in prosecution against unlicensed food premises was due to: (a) the shorter time taken for operators to get a provisional licence to operate their business legally; and (b) the fact that FEHD has since 2001 changed tactics in enforcement by seizing all the food and paraphernalia used in the unlicensed activities. This measure has proved very effective in reducing the re-opening of unlicensed food business.

(c) The numbers of successful prosecutions (i.e. convictions) for both licensed and unlicensed food premises in 2000-01 and 2001-02 are 9 631 and 6 446 respectively. There was one unsuccessful prosecution case in 2000-01, the defendant was acquitted due to the benefit of doubt.

The actual number of samples taken will vary from year to year as the sampling size and the type of food samples taken are regularly reviewed to take account of general food safety trends and the needs of the time.
- (b) The decrease in the number of blood samples taken from poultry for testing of avian influenza H5 is mainly due to reduced live poultry supply. Arising from the 2001 avian influenza outbreak, supply of live poultry to Hong Kong was temporarily suspended between 18 May to 14 June 2001.
- (c) Depending on the actual field conditions, trapping or poisoning is used to control rodent problems. The decrease in the number of trappings in 2001 was offset by an increase in the number of poison treatments employed from 44 802 in 2000 to 58 724 in 2001.

A. The main objectives of the Consultancy Study are :

- a) to study the overall impact of development on wetland resources and identify practicable means of mitigation including compensation for the impact on wetlands, particularly in Ramsar Site and its surroundings; and
- b) to recommend a strategy on wetland compensation for continual and cumulative loss of wetlands as a result of development, thereby ensuring that impacts to ecological resources in important wetland areas, particularly in north and northwest New Territories areas, can be avoided or minimized.

The total approved commitment is \$50M and the breakdown by the main tasks of the Study are as follows:

- 1) Desktop study including literature review, search and analysis of information, assessment of impacts, review of existing practices, consultation with stakeholders, and formulation of a strategy for wetland compensation. (Total estimate: \$6.57M)
- 2) Field surveys, and classification, mapping and analysis of the field data on wetlands in Hong Kong. (Total estimate: \$6.43M)

- 3) Planning and implementation of a 12-month field trial on practicable mitigation measures for enhancement and management of wetland sites viz. 16 ponds at Shenzhen River, 8 ponds at Shan Pui River, a section of Kam Tin Main Drainage Channel, a section of Lam Tsuen River Channel, and 2 ponds at Ma On Kong. The main tasks include design and development of field trial models, supervision and progress reporting, landscape and management works, ecological monitoring works, supporting services, and assessment and analysis of results. (Total estimate: \$22.12M)
- 4) Setting up a Geographic Information System (including equipment) to keep an inventory of wetlands in Hong Kong. (Total estimate: \$0.62M)
- 5) Consideration for follow-up on the findings of the consultancy study upon acceptance (Total estimate: \$14.26M)
- B. The original schedule was to complete the Study in 2001. It is behind schedule because the consultants require a longer time than envisaged to conduct the field works and the subsequent mapping, due to the unexpectedly high number of wetland sites and their extensive coverage in the SAR (some 4 750 sites, about 10 000 ha. of 12 different types were identified). Due to the complexity of the design works required, the field trial also needs to take more time. The first part of the Study on developing a wetland compensation strategy is expected to be completed in 2002. The second part of the Study, i.e. the field trial, has started in December 2001 and will be completed towards the end of 2002-03.

As the process of producing tree seedlings takes on average two to three years' lead time, AFCD has already scaled down production in 2000 to meet the above initiative and deleted 10 posts (1 Field Assistant, 3 Artisan, 4 Workmen I and 2 Workmen II) with a total saving of \$1.4 million.
- (b) In the coming year, we will step up patrols and clearance of Mikania micrantha in country parks and organise volunteers to help with its clearance. These will all form part of our regular vegetation management programme in country parks and additional resources are not required.

To promote public awareness on eco-tourism, we will recruit and train volunteers as helpers and tour guides for local wetland. We will also organise a publicity drive to promote eco-tourism at Tung Ping Chau and Sai Kung; issue weekly eco-diary publicizing interesting wildlife; and publish books on natural features of the rural areas. In addition, we will build a new Nature Trail through Pokfulam and Lung Fu Shan country parks, and provide more interpretative signs in country parks to assist both local and overseas tourists in the appreciation of nature.

We have assigned 2 Field Officer II and 70 part-time staff, and earmarked some \$2.5 million in departmental expense to implement these programmes.

The required resources will be absorbed by the department through internal redeployment and enhanced productivity. No additional resources will be required.
- (b) The resources earmarked for the management of new marine parks include a sum of \$0.822 million for the creation of 3 civil service posts and a sum of \$2.8 million for employing 11 contract staff and other recurrent expenses. Another \$11 million has also been earmarked for purchasing two patrol vessels.

(c) The ecological monitoring programme for Mai Po and Inner Deep Bay Ramsar site will be contracted out. The estimated cost is about 1.3 million in 2002-03.

The subvention to the World Wide Fund for Nature (Hong Kong) is for engaging the organisation to run a nature conservation education programme at the Island House Conservation Studies Centre for schools. The programme aims at enhancing students' understanding and awareness of the importance of nature conservation.

The Hong Kong Government contributes US\$10,000 annually to be a member of the Network of Aquaculture Centres in Asia and Pacific (NACA). Through participation in NACA, we can keep abreast of aquaculture development in the region and obtain up-to-date information on aquaculture techniques.

The subvention to the Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (SPCA) is to cover its work on stray animal control, enforcement activities relating to the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Ordinance, rehoming of animals and public education to promote responsible pet ownership.

(b) The subventions are made to meet part of the recurrent operational expense of these organisations in implementing the programmes mentioned above. The estimates are based on the specific tasks that they will accomplish in the financial year and the past years' experience. The contribution to NACA is the lowest level of contribution applicable to city states or urban governments.

The landfill gas generated from the three strategic landfills in Nim Wan, Tseung Kwan O and Ta Kwu Ling is currently collected on-site. About 53% of the total gas generated is being used for heating and electricity generation for on-site facilities such as site offices, pumping station and leachate treatment plant. The remaining landfill gas is flared for safety to prevent its emission into the atmosphere.

For the closed restored landfills, landfill gas is also collected of which about 35% is used either on-site or off-site for leachate treatment, electricity generation or industrial use while the remaining portion is flared.

To increase the utilisation of landfill gas for other beneficial uses, the government is actively exploring with the landfill contractors and utility companies (such as power and gas companies) to identify viable schemes to further utilise the landfill gas at both the strategic landfills and restored landfills. There is no funding reserved for landfill gas utilisation in 2002-03 as the landfill contractors would undertake the necessary studies themselves.

Based on overseas experience, we have developed a risk-based assessment framework and we are now developing specific standards that suit the local condition. We plan to consult the planners, consultants, land developers, academics, professional bodies and other concerned stakeholders when the framework and the standards are ready later in the year. This work will be undertaken by EPD staff at an estimated cost of \$360,000.
- (b) Through the environmental impact assessment (EIA) process, a number of government and private sites were found to be contaminated to different degree. These sites include the old Kai Tak Airport, the Cheoy Lee Shipyard, the old Kwai Chung and Kennedy Town incinerator sites, the North Tsing Yi shipyards, the industrial lots at Yau Tong Bay. The total site area amounts to around 210 ha. The most common contaminants found are heavy metals and petroleum hydrocarbons. The cleanup methods most commonly adopted are: cement solidification to stabilise the heavy metals, and soil venting or bioremediation for hydrocarbon-contaminated soil. The cost of cleanup depends on the nature and extent of contamination and is project specific.

Follow up meetings with the mobile phones industry, vehicle tyres association and computers industry have been held with a view to examining overseas experience of successful product responsibility schemes that are applicable to Hong Kong. The goal is to work out arrangements that can be implemented on a voluntary basis as far as possible before mandatory schemes are considered.

Good progress has been made with the mobile phones industry and a voluntary scheme to recycle mobile phone batteries will be launched by mid April 2002. This pilot scheme is funded through cost sharing by the participating companies. The detailed arrangements are being finalised and an announcement will be made soon. This will be the first example of a successful industry-wide product responsibility scheme in Hong Kong. A sum of \$13 million will be made available in 2002-03 for the Environmental Protection Department to implement the various product responsibility programmes.

(b) The environmental noise complaints handled by the Environmental Protection Department (EPD) were 4977, 4744 and 5468 in 1999, 2000 and 2001 respectively. Most of these complaints were related to complaint against noise from construction activities or commercial/industrial activities.

For road traffic noise and day-time general construction noise, there are no statutory levels applicable under the Noise Control Ordinance (NCO).

For cases relating to construction activities during the restricted hours (i.e. between 7 p.m. and 7 a.m. or at any time on a general holiday), there were 278, 404 and 273 prosecutions under the NCO in 1999, 2000 and 2001 respectively.

For commercial and industrial noise, many complaints on commercial/industrial noise were resolved promptly through advice given by the EPD during site investigations. The EPD would serve noise abatement notices for those cases that were found to exceed the statutory levels, requiring the abatement of the noise within a period of time. 231, 237 and 167 notices were issued in 1999, 2000 and 2001 respectively. There were 75, 65 and 54 prosecutions in 1999, 2000 and 2001 respectively due to failure to comply with the requirements in the notices within the specified time period.

A total of seven verbal warnings and two warning letters were issued to them. Subsequent inspections showed that the requirement and conditions had been complied with and no further action was required.

Reply:

The 2002 Budget makes the point cited in the question in general terms. The Government does not have in mind any specific projects at this stage. We will consider whether and, if so, what appropriate measures need to be taken when we come across such projects.

The Government's strong commitment to environmental improvement in recent years should also create a business environment which is conducive to development of the environmental industry. Taking the recycling industry as an example, we have launched a series of initiatives to promote waste separation and recovery. These initiatives would ensure more recyclable material and in turn business opportunities for the industry. We have also set aside 20 hectares of long-term land for establishing a Recovery Park for waste recovery operations and will continue to provide land on short-term tenancies exclusively for the recycling industry. Funding is also available from the Environment and Conservation Fund (ECF) and the Innovation and Technology Fund for the demonstration or development of recycling technologies.

In 2002-03, we have earmarked \$47 million for meeting the recurrent expenditure for promoting waste separation and recovery in Hong Kong. We will shortly seek the approval of the LegCo Finance Committee for an injection of \$100 million into the ECF primarily to support community-based waste recovery projects.

The aim is to work out arrangements that can be implemented on a voluntary basis as far as possible before mandatory schemes are considered. In 2002-03, a sum of \$13 million will be made available for the Environmental Protection Department to implement the various product responsibility programmes. Reply: The Government will continue to award contracts to waste management companies (e.g. composting plant at Ngau Tam Mei and collection of plastic bottles) as and when there are suitable opportunities. However, a more effective way to encourage the private sector to participate in recycling is to improve the business environment so as to create more business opportunities in waste recycling. In this connection, we will continue to launch publicity and education programmes to further increase the amount of recyclables available for collection from all sources. We have been implementing community and district recycling projects as well as collection services to reduce the cost burden of private companies in the collection of recyclables that have a low profit margin. We will continue to provide more land at low cost through short term tenancies in 2002-03 for use by recycling industry. A preliminary study on the development and management framework of a recovery park on long term land in Tuen Mun Area 38 is scheduled for completion in May 2002. In addition, technical advice and assistance are being given to the private sector in helping them to better understand the business opportunities in waste recycling.

<u>Reply</u>: Preliminary environmental reviews and class assessments are conducted to address the possible environmental implications for public works projects prior to submission of funding proposals under the Capital Works Resource Allocation Exercise (RAE).

To expedite the public works programmes, the Government has streamlined the procedures involved since late 2001. Under the new procedure, preliminary environmental reviews would only be required for cases that are not designated projects and hence not subject to control under the Environmental Impact Assessment Ordinance, and where standard pollution control measures might not be sufficient. Hence, the number of preliminary environmental reviews and class assessments for 2002 is expected to reduce to 15.

- a) In 2001, 117,500 tonnes of grease trap waste were treated at the grease trap waste treatment plant in the West New Territories Landfill where the aqueous portion was removed and treated and the residual grease was thickened for landfill disposal. This amounted to a total treatment and disposal cost of \$17.3 million. In 2002, the amount of grease trap waste to be delivered to the treatment plant is expected to be about the same and hence the expenditure is estimated to be around \$18 million. As there is no charge for disposal of waste at landfills at present, the Government is therefore fully subsidising such treatment and disposal cost.
- (b) The Government always welcomes viable technologies or methods in the recycling of grease trap waste and would consider schemes that could be practically adopted in Hong Kong.

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Reply:

So far, the Administration has 2 grant schemes to reduce motor vehicle emissions. Details are given below:

LPG taxis

The Administration started in August 2000 a one-off grant of \$40 000 each to encourage the replacement of diesel taxis by LPG vehicles. As at end 2001, 14,179 diesel taxis (i.e. about 80% of the taxi fleet) had been replaced by LPG vehicles.

Traps/Catalysts

Another scheme provided a subsidy of \$1,300 each to assist pre-Euro light diesel vehicles to be installed with traps or catalysts. The installation started in September 2000 and ended in October 2001. These vehicles are mainly light goods vehicles, diesel taxis, light buses and a small number of old diesel private cars. As at end 2001, 23,950 vehicles (about 80% of the eligible vehicle fleet) had been retrofitted with traps or catalysts.

- (b) Before the above two measures and other air quality improvement measures such as the introduction of ultra low sulphur diesel were taken, at the roadside of Causeway Bay and Central, the average concentrations of respirable suspended particulates and nitrogen oxides in 1999 were respectively 91 and 454 micrograms per cubic metre. In 2001, the averaged concentrations of these 2 air pollutants were 84 and 404 micrograms per cubic metre respectively. There was a reduction by about 8% and 11% repectively.
- (c) For introducing LPG taxis, the approved commitment by Finance Committee was \$725.5 million and the cumulative expenditure up to end 2001 was \$559.6 million. For installing traps or catalysts to pre-Euro light diesel vehicles, the approved commitment was \$50.9 million and the cumulative expenditure up to end 2001 was \$ 30.6 million.

Reply:

The Administration plans to allocate \$709 million (subject to the funding approval from the Finance Committee) to help vehicle owners of pre-Euro large diesel vehicles (ie. of vehicle weight over 4 tonnes) to retrofit particulate removal devices, and is consulting the light bus trade on a proposed incentive scheme for introducing LPG or electric light buses. Details of these two programmes are as follows:-

1. Particulate Removal Devices

For pre-Euro large diesel vehicles that do not need to undertake long idling duties, suitable particulate reduction devices have been found. In the next few months, we are planning to seek approval from the Finance Committee for funding to install particulate reduction devices in them. Subject to the funding approval, our plan is to invite tender in the middle of the year and start the retrofit programme late this year. These devices can reduce more than 35% of the vehicles' particulate emissions. For those pre-Euro heavy diesel vehicles that need to undertake long idling duties, we shall seek funding approval from the Finance Committee for the installation when suitable particulate reduction devices are found.

2. Light Buses Using Cleaner Fuels

The Administration has announced a proposed incentive scheme, which comprises a one-off grant for public light buses and an exemption of first registration tax for private light buses, to encourage existing diesel light buses to be replaced by LPG or electric light buses. LPG light buses are considerably cleaner than diesel light buses. They emit almost no particulates and only 50% of the nitrogen oxides of Euro III diesel light buses. Electric light buses have no tailpipe emissions.

The precise budget and phasing of expenditure for the proposed programmes will be worked out when the proposals are finalised.

The Environmental Campaign Committee (ECC), comprising all non-officials, is responsible for vetting applications for funding EE & CA projects. For assessment on EE & CA projects, according to the direction set out by the ECF, all recipient organisations are requested to submit the activity reports of the funded projects, giving an assessment of the effectiveness of the projects. They are requested to specify 'the overall assessment of the implemented projects', 'Objectives that have been achieved' and 'Objectives that cannot be achieved and the reasons'. The reports must be endorsed by the Vetting Committee members of ECC before the release of the remaining balances. During the past few years, all the activity reports were endorsed by the Vetting Committee.

To make the assessment more comprehensive, the Vetting Committee members decided in January 2002 to send ECC Secretariat staff to carry out on site assessments on major projects so as to ensure the projects achieve the expected objectives. In fact, ECC has implemented the site inspection system on Waste Recovery Schemes, which are jointly organised by ECC and community groups in 2001. ECC Secretariat carried out site inspections to assess the progress of the schemes.

In addition, the ECF provided funding for ECC to carry out territory wide environmental campaigns for schools, tertiary institutes, housing estates, business sectors, community groups and District Councils. The projects were monitored and assessed by ECC and its sub-working groups.

This is due to the continued implementation of pollution control measures and sewerage programmes. Comparing the percentage compliance rate between 2001 and 2002, we expect the major change will be in the Victoria Harbour Water Control Zone due to the full commissioning of Stage I of the Harbour Area Treatment Scheme.

Reply:

The Administration will organize a large number of environmental awareness and education programmes in 2002-03. The Environmental Protection Department (EPD) will continue a 2-year "Green Leader Programme" to promote environmental awareness among ten target groups by providing tailor-made environmental training programmes in a more strategic way. The major target groups are Members of the District Councils, residents' organization of housing estates, community groups, women's associations, youth centres, school principals, transport operators, business sectors. Funds of \$1.1 million have been set aside under the Capital Account to support this programme in 2002-03. In addition, the EPD will continue to raise public awareness in the importance of and Government's effort in cleaning up the harbour and will spend about \$0.5 million for this purpose under the Capital Account in 2002-03.

Additional provision of \$14.8 million under the Recurrent Account will be allocated to the EPD for enhancing public education and community involvement in "waste reduction and recovery" and implementing the "Community Green Network Programme" in 2002-03. For the "waste reduction and recovery" programme, it aims to educate the general public especially the residents of the housing estates and children. A Liquefied Petroleum Gas van will continue to be used as a Theme Van on Waste Reduction to reach out to housing estates, schools and community centres. Moreover, a series of publicity and education packages like mini-TV programmes, VCDs and supplementary education materials will be produced for children and teachers. For the "Community Green Network Programme", it aims to educate the general public to understand more and care for our environment and the government's environmental initiatives. It is planned to set up "Green Desk", an environmental information counter in community centres, shopping malls or housing estates; to set up a new environmental resource centre; to implement the outreach programme for schools; and to work with District Councils and community groups to organize strategic education programmes in the districts.

Subject to the approval of the allocation of by the Environment and Conservation Fund, the Environmental Campaign Committee (ECC) will organize the following major environmental awareness and education programmes. These programmes include Waste Recovery Schemes, Environmental Education & Community Action Projects and ECC's core programmes. The core programmes include World Environment Day, Hong Kong Environmental Protection Festival, Environmental Protection Ambassador Schemes for students, youths and housing residents, Hong Kong Green School Award, Waste Recycling Schemes for housing estates, schools, tertiary & vocational institutes and Hong Kong Eco-Business Awards.

- Reply: (a) Of the \$34.3 million allocated by the Government for the waste facilities programme in 2002-03, \$13 million is for the development of product responsibility schemes; \$8 million for strengthening support for waste separation and recovery; and the remaining for enhancing education and public participation in waste reduction.
 - (b) Of the five posts to be created, one Senior Environmental Protection Officer and three Environmental Protection Officers are for developing product responsibility schemes and strengthening the support for waste separation and recovery whilst one Environmental Protection Inspector is for supervising the operation of the multi-purpose grass pitch on the restored Sai Tso Wan landfill.
 - (c) We will continue to provide more waste separation bins to facilitate the public to participate in waste separation. At present, about 19,600 waste separation bins have been placed in public venues, schools and public/private housing estates. In the coming year, we hope to increase the number of bins to 28,000. Around \$5 million will be required to procure the additional bins. We have not set aside specific provision for this purpose as departments concerned will absorb the cost of the bins. Separately, the Food and Environmental Hygience Department has set aside \$2.31 million to hire contractors to collect the recyclables at public venues for delivery to waste recyclers/exporters.
 - (d) With an allocation of \$8 million in 2002-03 for strengthening support for waste separation and recovery, the Environmental Protection Department will work to enhance plastic bottles recovery. We will try out and implement different collection services including an extension of the existing central plastic bottles collection trial and develop a pilot recycling centre to support the collection services. We will also explore alternative uses and new markets for the collected plastic bottles.

- (a) The substantial reduction in the number of smoky vehicle reports processed and smoky vehicles tested in 2001 was the result of a number of measures that include introduction of ultra-low sulphur diesel; 80% of diesel taxis replaced by LPG taxis; introduction of the dynamometer smoke test; increased fixed penalty against smoky vehicles and installation of particulate removal devices to pre-Euro diesel light vehicles. Though the control measures will continue to reduce the number of smoky vehicles, more spotters are being trained up. Hence we expect the numbers in 2002-03 will be about the same as 2001-02. The slight increase is because of the use of rounded-up figures.
- (b) The proposal is to develop a scheme to spot petrol and LPG vehicles emitting excessive emissions so that they can be notified for repair. A technical review panel comprising technical experts, academics and representatives of relevant government departments has been formed to guide the development of the proposal. Relevant trades will be consulted during the development process when more details are available.
- (c) The proposed incentive scheme to encourage early replacement of diesel light buses with LPG or electric light buses includes a one-off grant for replacing diesel public light buses and an exemption of first registration tax for replacing private diesel light buses. The estimated expenditure will be worked out as we finalise the proposed scheme taking into account the outcome of the consultation and subject to approval by the Finance Committee.
- (d) In 2002-03, the Administration's plan for further reducing motor vehicle emissions include:
 - assisting owners of pre-Euro heavy diesel vehicles to install diesel oxidation catalysts or other emission reduction devices;
 - providing an incentive to encourage switch from diesel light buses to LPG and electric;
 - working on a proposal to strengthen the emission inspection system for petrol and LPG vehicles; and
 - proposing legislation to require pre-Euro diesel vehicles up to four tonnes to have particulate removal device.

The decrease in financial provision for the Air Programme is mainly because of (a) the completion of the retrofit programme for the pre-Euro diesel light vehicles with particulate traps or catalysts (Capital Account Subhead 700 Item 553) and (b) over 80% of the diesel taxis have been replaced with LPG taxis (Capital Account Subhead 700 Item 554).

The revised estimated expenditure of item 553 and item 554 was \$29M and \$383.8M respectively for 2001-02. Item 553 was completed in 2001-02 and for item 554 the estimated expenditure for 2002-03 is \$75.2M. These 2 accounts alone have already attributed to a decrease in the provision in the 2002-03 estimate against the revised estimate for 2001-02 by \$337.6M, representing 53%. Excluding Capital Account, there is an increase of about 3.1% on the provision for recurrent expenditure for the Air Programme.

The disposal of waste at landfills is still currently free of charge. The Government will continue to discuss with the waste producers and haulers to work out the details of a landfill charging scheme, initially for construction and demolition waste.

- (b) In 2002-03, the Environmental Protection Department will continue to liaise further with the mobile phones industry, vehicle tyres association and computers industry to develop producer or product responsibility schemes. The aim is to examine overseas experience of successful schemes that are applicable to Hong Kong and to work out arrangements that can be implemented on a voluntary basis as far as possible before mandatory schemes are considered. A sum of \$13 million will be made available in 2002-03 for the Environmental Protection Department to implement the various product responsibility programmes.
- (c) The Government will seek approval from the Finance Committee to inject \$100 million into the Environment and Conservation Fund largely to support waste reduction and recycling projects organised

by community organizations and green groups at district level. In addition to the Environment and Conservation Fund, a sum of \$8 million will be made available in 2002-03 for the Environmental Protection Department to (i) assist community parties to implement district waste reduction and recycling projects; (ii) try out and implement different district level recyclables collection arrangements and services; and (iii) set up a pilot district-based recycling centre to test the viability of processing recyclables that are facing collection difficulties.

It is expected that some job opportunities will be created through employment of staff by the project proponents to implement district projects as well as contracting out the running of the pilot recycling centre and provision of recyclables collection services by the Government. The actual number of jobs created can only be ascertained after the projects are confirmed.

(d) At present, there are a total of 3 strategic landfills and 8 refuse transfer stations. For each landfill, there are 9 government site staff and between 140 to 190 employees hired by the contractors depending on the extent of site works and quantity of waste handled. For each refuse transfer station, there are 5 government site staff and between 35 to over 100 contractor employees on average depending on the size of the transfer station.

- (a) The importation of chilled meat into Hong Kong, regardless of its place of origin, is subject to stringent and statutory safety and hygiene requirements. Every consignment of imported chilled meat must be accompanied by an official health certificate issued by a competent veterinary authority certifying that the meat is fit for human consumption. Inspection and taking of samples are conducted at the import, wholesale and retail levels to ensure compliance with our requirements. The additional work relating to control on chilled meat imported from the Mainland will be absorbed within existing resources.
- (b) Imported chilled meat from the Mainland will be included in FEHD's food surveillance programme for quality and safety control. The additional work arising will be absorbed and taken up by existing staff of the Department.

In 2002-03, the amount reserved for the avian influenza surveillance programme is \$39.7M. Based on an estimated annual live poultry consumption of 34.54 million, the expenditure incurred for each chicken in 2001-02 is \$0.96 and in 2002-03 will be \$1.15.
- (b) For 2002-03, AFCD have made provision for the creation of 11 new posts for local livestock farm inspections (one Senior Veterinary Officer and one Veterinary Officer supported by 9 field staff). These staff will devote about 40% of their time to monitoring local poultry farms for avian influenza and ensuring farms meet new, improved hygiene and biosecurity standards.
- (c) We have not taken a view on vaccination of live chickens as we are still studying the feasibility of this approach.

It is only when the number of illegal hawkers dropped below the above standard that the location will be removed from the list of hawker blackspots.

During the third outbreak of the avian flu in early February, officials of the Environment and Food Bureau (EFB) and the Food and Environmental Hygiene Department put part of the blame on poultry traders who hid their poultry on the rest day, making it impossible to break the virus cycle. Officials also pointed out that the next few years would be the peak period of avian flu in Hong Kong and South China and that the possibility of another outbreak of avian flu could not be ruled out. Medical professionals even pointed out that the avian flu had become a local epidemic. Will the Secretary please inform us:

Whether any resources have been reserved this year for adopting special measures to prevent the recurrence of the avian flu? If so, the details. Will the measures include the provision of a wholesale market or other markets for handling chickens from local farms for sale to retail markets?

Asked by: Hon. CHEUNG Yu-yan, Tommy

Reply:

We highlighted the lack of co-operation from a small number of stall-holders to underline the importance of support from the trades concerned in controlling avian flu.

The Administration has reserved resources for continued implementation of the avian influenza surveillance programme in 2002-03. These include \$13.7 million for the Agriculture, Fisheries and Conservation Department and \$26.0 million for the Food and Environmental Hygiene Department.

We have appointed an Investigation Team to establish the cause(s) of the recent outbreak and to recommend measures to reduce the likelihood of such incidents in the future. We will take into account the recommendations of the Investigation Team in formulating longer term measures on combatting avian flu. As the Investigation Team has not yet completed its work, it is not possible for us to spell out the nature and details of these measures and whether we would require additional resources at this stage.

 - (ii) expediting the process of licence applications with the granting of provisional licences; and
 - (iii) providing free hygiene courses for food handlers to promote good hygiene practices and to enhance their awareness of their legal obligations.
- (b) While FEHD takes stringent enforcement actions, it also promotes the rehabilitation of offending licensees. Instead of suspending or cancelling the licence on accumulation of the prescribed number of demerit points, the licensee concerned may be given a second chance by undertaking not to commit any further contraventions within a specified period. In this regard, the considerations are often whether the licensee has improved in compliance and in the hygiene condition of his premises. As a result, the number of food business licences to be suspended / cancelled is expected to drop slightly.

(c) Under the Demerit Points System, a prescribed number of demerit points ranging from five to 15 will be registered against a licensed premise for convicted contraventions. The first accumulation of 15 points within 12 months may lead to a 7-day suspension. A second and third accumulation of 15 points, each within a 12-month period, may lead to a 14-day suspension and cancellation of licence respectively.

- (a) The functions of the Quality Assurance Section (QAS) are as follows -
 - (i) conduct regulatory inspections on services and identify inadequacies in systems, procedures and guidelines with a view to making recommendations for improvement;
 - (ii) investigate into complaints concerning staff misconduct; and
 - (iii) report on good performers for appropriate recognition by the management.
- (b) The staff establishment of the QAS for the year 2001-02 is at Annex. Subject to review of possible deletion of one vacant post of Senior Executive Officer (SEO), the staff establishment of the QAS for the year 2002-03 would be reduced by one.
- (c) The revised expenditure in 2001-02 is \$12,393,000. Subject to the deletion of one SEO post mentioned in paragraph (b) above, the estimated expenditure in 2002-03 would be reduced to \$11,838,320.
- (d) The QAS' main focus is on the service quality of the Department as a whole and is not targetting at a particular grade or rank of staff. Investigation of an individual staff will only be initiated in response to complaints received and are all work-related. Depending

on the nature of the inspections or investigations, most are carried out with the full knowledge of the staff of the concerned work unit. Others are required to be carried out without the prior knowledge of the concerned staff.

- (e) The effectiveness of the QAS is reviewed regularly. Indicators of its effectiveness include
 - (i) the quantity and quality of the inspections and investigations done and recommendations made to improve systems and procedures; and
 - (ii) the appropriateness of its tactics and modus operandi in tackling inspections and complaints of various sorts.

Considering that the section has —

- (i) carried out no less than 1300 inspections and investigated about 300 complaints since its inception in October 2000;
- (ii) made a number of useful suggestions on ways to improve systems and procedures after the inspections of services and investigation of complaints; and
- (iii) helped to inculcate a more vigorous work culture in different work units,

the QAS has rendered useful contribution to enhancing the quality and cost-effectiveness of services of the Department.

(f) From 1 October 2000 to 28 February 2002, the Department has received 13 complaints against the QAS. These complaints were taken up by the Complaints Management Section for independent investigation.

In 2001-02, \$0.63M has been spent for the control of Mikania in ecological sensitive areas in the countryside including Sites of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) and Mai Po Nature Reserve. The work includes manual clearance of Mikania (about 17 hectares), planting of tree seedlings to rehabilitate the sites and regular monitoring of the condition of the sites.

To enhance the control of Mikania in ecologically sensitive areas in the countryside in 2002-03, we will step up inspection and manual clearance of the climbers, and actively maintain the tree seedlings planted. It is estimated that \$0.70M will be spent for the purpose in the year. We will also organise volunteers to take part in the Mikania control work.

We have also commissioned the Forestry Bureau of Guangdong Province to conduct a study on controlling Mikania in Hong Kong. The study has commenced in December 2001 and is scheduled to be completed by the end of 2003. The total cost involved is \$0.268M.

Reply:

- (a) The Administration is acutely aware of the need to make sure that staff conducting farm visits take all possible precautions to prevent carriage of disease from farm to farm. All field staff are fully trained in this area before going on to farms. On entering any livestock farm they must put on a complete set of disposable protective clothing. This is removed and discarded when they leave the farm. Any member of staff entering a farm known to be infected with avian influenza or other serious disease is not permitted to enter a non-infected farm for a minimum of 48 hours.
- (b) The Administration is introducing new biosecurity and hygiene measures for local poultry farms. These include measures covering movement of poultry on, off and between farms, disinfection of vehicles entering and leaving farms and controls on movement of people on the farm. In 2002-03 we have made provision for the creation of 11 new posts for local livestock farm inspection (one Senior Veterinary Officer, and one Veterinary Officer supported by 9

field staff). They will be allocated to step up farm inspections and enforce the new requirements. They will devote 40% of their time to avian influenza monitoring.

Reply:

The purpose for building up the ecological database is to help identify and monitor the natural biological assets in Hong Kong. It will cover all important habitats in the territory, including the distribution of rare plant communities and animal species.

The database will be built up through territory-wide surveys mapping out the distribution and status of habitats and species present. Where necessary, biological specimens will also be collected for authentication as well as for future reference. This database will then be regularly updated through long term continuous monitoring to ensure its accuracy and relevancy over time.

We will use the database to identify ecologically important areas and species present in the territory. The information can facilitate the formulation of our conservation programmes; and the conduct of ecological impact assessment including the design of mitigation plans during the environmental impact assessment process.

A half-year provision of \$1.923 million in 2002-03 and an annual provision of \$3.846 million for the years between 2003-04 and 2005-06 have been earmarked for the purpose. The provision includes the creation of one professional officer and one field officer posts responsible for planning the surveys and monitoring out-sourced surveys.

We will develop the survey programme in 2002 and start setting up the database by phases in early 2003 for completion in around 2005.

- (a) In 2001-02, the estimated total cost of the avian influenza surveillance programme is \$33.1 million. This does not include the expenditure involved in controlling the outbreaks that occurred in May 2001 and February 2002. In 2002-03, the amount reserved for the avian influenza surveillance programme is \$39.7 million. Based on an estimated annual live poultry consumption of 34.54 million, the expenditure incurred for each chicken in 2001-02 is \$0.96 and in 2002-03 will be \$1.15.
- (b) For 2002-03, AFCD have made provision for the creation of 11 new posts for local livestock farm inspections (one Senior Veterinary Officer and one Veterinary Officer supported by 9 field staff). These staff will devote about 40% of their time to monitoring local poultry farms for avian influenza and ensuring farms meet new, improved hygiene and biosecurity standards.
- (c) We have not taken a view on vaccination of live chickens as we are still studying the feasibility of this approach.

In 2001-02, we deployed one Senior Veterinary Officer and two Veterinary Officers, supported by 22 technical and 11 field staff, to undertake monitoring and testing for avian influenza and other diseases of livestock. The total allocation for work on avian influenza was \$9.00 million.

In 2002-03, we have included a provision for 11 additional staff (1 Senior Veterinary Officer and 1 Veterinary Officer supported by 9 field personnel) to expand our local farm inspection programme. They will devote 40% of their time to avian influenza monitoring. We also created 8 new laboratory positions (1 Veterinary Officer supported by 7 technical staff) to cater for increased livestock disease testing. They will devote 70% of their time to avian influenza testing. The total amount of new resources in 2002-03 for avian influenza monitoring is \$4.7 million.
