Question: On subvention for training courses/programmes offered by the Skills Centres of the Vocational Training Council for persons with disabilities aged 15 or above to enhance their employment prospectus, Hon. CHAN FANG On-sang, Anson noted that less than 40% of the trainees enrolled for the courses completed the training programmes. The Administration was requested to:

- a) provide information and statistics on the number of trainees enrolled on and completed the courses in respect of various courses;
- b) account for the low graduation rate; and
- c) consider what measures would be adopted to improve the situation.

Reply: a) The numbers of trainees who have enrolled on and completed the various courses in academic year (AY) 2006/07 are set out at Annex.

- b) The full-time training courses offered by the Skills Centres are mostly of two-year duration (except for Massage Service course). The number of trainees completing their training every year, therefore, will not be more than half of the total training places offered each year. In AY 2006/07, 290 out of a total enrolment of 621 trainees in the three Skills Centres were undertaking their second year of training and were expected to graduate at the end of the academic year. Altogether 245 trainees completed their training in AY 2006/07, representing a graduation rate of about 84.5%. There was a small number of trainees (45 in AY 2006/07) who could not complete their training, and this was mainly due to health problems or loss of interest in the studies.
- c) On-going efforts are being made to provide counselling and support services to the trainees to help them complete their training and enhance their employability. More trade visits, extra-curricular activities and group sessions on social, interpersonal skills are arranged to better arouse and sustain trainees' interest.

The above utilisation rates suggest that the current provision of different child care services is adequate to meet demand. The Social Welfare Department will continue to oversee the supply and utilisation of various child care services so as to ensure adequate provision to assist children and families in need of the services.

To supplement the provision of existing child care services, the Administration will provide funding of \$45 million over the next three years to pilot more flexible forms of day child care services at the neighbourhood level that offer greater flexibility to meet the needs of the parents; and for strengthening day foster care service.

Reply: To increase connection with needy families, including families at risk of domestic violence, psychiatric problems and social isolation, who are reluctant to seek help, the FSP has been launched in 61 IFSCs, 2 ISCs, 11 FCPSUs and 8 Psychiatric Medical Social Services Units since early 2007. Under the FSP, through telephone contacts, home visits and other outreaching programmes, we seek to introduce needy families to various support services available and motivate them to receive services to prevent further deterioration of their problems. Volunteers including those who have personal experience in overcoming family/personal problems or crises have been recruited and trained to contact these families and to provide them with support and assistance.

With the additional annual recurrent resources of \$30 million, additional manpower, including social work and non-social work staff, have been provided to the above-mentioned Units. Since the outreaching activities under the FSP is part and parcel of the services provided by these Units, there is no breakdown of the number of staff involved.

Reply (1) While the Administration will endeavour to ensure a steady increase in subsidised residential care places, we are unable to set a definite target and a timetable for the provision of new places due to a number of uncertainties, including the availability of resources and suitable sites.

At the same time, the Administration will continue to promote the three-pronged development of private, self-financed and subsidised residential care services so as to provide more service options for persons with disabilities (PWDs). We will also continue to develop people-oriented community support services in order to facilitate the PWDs' community living.

(2) The majority of PWDs on the waiting list for subsidised residential care places are receiving various day training, vocational rehabilitation and community support services provided by the Social Welfare Department. These include services at day activity centres and sheltered workshops, services in supported employment, day care for severely disabled persons, home-based training and support etc. Through such rehabilitation services, PWDs are provided with the necessary support and assistance to

enable them to continue to live in the community while alleviating the stress on their families or carers.

Question: In the reply numbered LWB(WW)135, the Administration lists out the number of participants and the effectiveness of various employment assistance projects. The information provided reveals that some of these projects are not very effective as more than half of the participants have failed to secure full-time employment. In this regard, would the Administration please inform this Committee:

- (1) how many recipients have secured semi or part-time paid employment apart from full-time employment with the help from the above employment assistance projects?
- (2) whether it will review and revise the above employment assistance projects in 2008-09 to equip the participants with better skills and training for securing full-time employment?
- (3) whether it will take follow-up action to assist those recipients who have participated in the projects but still cannot secure full-time employment?
- (4) whether it will take follow-up action to check the progress of those recipients who have secured full-time employment at their early stage of employment and provide them with support?

Reply: (1) Among the employment assistance projects, we have kept records on part-time employment of the participants in addition to those of full-time employment only for the Special Training and Enhancement Programme (My STEP) and the Extended Community Work Experience and Training Programme (Extended CWETP). Up to end-January 2008, out of the total of 317 participants in My STEP, nine participants have taken up part-time employment and amongst the 434 participants in Extended CWETP, 44 participants have secured part-time employment.

- (2) Reviewing the existing arrangements under the Comprehensive Social Security Assistance (CSSA) Scheme for helping and motivating the unemployed able-bodied recipients to rejoin the labour force and become self-reliant is an on-going effort. In 2008-09, we will continue to monitor the projects to ensure that the non-governmental organisations (NGOs) can fulfil all the requirements to assist and encourage the CSSA able-bodied unemployed recipients to seek and engage in full-time employment. In launching new employment assistance projects, we will take account of past experience to further improve the projects.
- (3) CSSA able-bodied unemployed recipients who have participated in the employment assistance projects but still cannot secure full-time employment will revert to the Active Employment Assistance (AEA) Programme under the CSSA Scheme. Under the AEA Programme, personalised employment assistance is rendered to recipients to overcome their work barriers and enhance their employability. They are required to regularly come to the relevant Social Security Field Units for interview and employment assistance.
- (4) NGOs operating the employment assistance projects provide post-placement services for participants for a period of no less than three months after they have secured full-time employment. The post-placement services include work-place visit, individual counselling service and mutual help group for sharing experience. These aim to help the participants overcome any difficulties they may encounter at the early stage of their employment.

Question: In the reply numbered LWB(WW) 221, the Administration states that it will further look into the ways to promote quality residential care services in self-financing/private residential care homes for the elderly (RCHEs). However, it was reported by the media the other day that some private RCHEs had pocketed the additional one-month Comprehensive Social Security Assistance payments for their residents. This reveals that there is room for improvement in monitoring private RCHEs. In this connection, would the Administration please inform this Committee of the following:

- (1) What is the manpower provision for monitoring and inspecting RCHEs in 2008-09? Is there any increase when comparing with that in 2007-08?
- (2) Did the Administration conduct surprise site inspections to all RCHEs in 2007-08? How many of them have been found non-compliant with the regulations and given warnings and being punished as a result? What is the total number of complaints on RCHEs received in 2007-08, out of which how many cases were successfully prosecuted?
- (3) What measures will be taken by the Administration in 2008-09 to step up monitoring of RCHEs? Would the Administration consider reviewing the Code of Practice for Residential Care Homes (Elderly Persons) (CoP) to reduce non-compliance?

Reply: (

- (1) Further to the creation of five Assistant Social Work Officer posts and one Senior Social Work Officer post in 2007-08, five Registered Nurse posts will be created in 2008-09 to replace the existing contract nurses in the Licensing Office of Residential Care Homes for the Elderly (LORCHE), making up a total of 38 inspectors to carry out the inspection duties.
- (2) LORCHE conducted unannounced inspections to all RCHEs. In 2007, about 360 warning letters and 3 000 advisory letters were issued to non-compliant RCHEs, requiring them to make improvement or rectifications within a reasonable period of time.

LORCHE received 273 complaints against 182 RCHEs. One of them was successfully prosecuted while other homes have made rectifications upon receiving advice/warning.

(3) In the coming year, LORCHE will step up monitoring of RCHEs by increasing the frequency of routine inspections and adopting a risk-based monitoring approach. In particular, inspections will be extended to non-office hours, Sundays and public holidays, focusing on high-risk items such as staffing, drug management and application of physical restraint, etc.

The existing CoP was revised in October 2005 and has been fully implemented since January 2006. Further review and revisions will be made as necessary. Apart from CoP, LORCHE has from time to time issued circular letters and guidelines concerning key aspects relating to the quality of care for elderly residents in RCHEs.
